This exhibit details the history of the various lumbermills that have occupied Port Moody since the 1880s. The majority of the exhibit is comprised of historical photographs owned by the Port Moody Station Museum.

The attached worksheets are designed to provide a means for students to interact with the online exhibit "Lumbermills of Port Moody". Students are asked to read or look at various parts of the exhibit to answer each of the questions.

The language in the worksheets and the exhibit is a grade 5 level at minimum. There may be some difficult vocabulary in the exhibit that you wish to review with your students beforehand.

- 1) Name 3 things lumber was used for in early Port Moody. Wharves, round houses, bunk houses, store houses, rail ties, bridges, trestles
- 2) What did the lumber industry bring to Port Moody after the CPR terminus was moved? jobs

- 4) Name one modern challenge the forest industry has. Energy crisis, global warming, computerization, environmental concerns, softwood lumber agreement

- 5) When was the first sawmill in Port Moody built? 1883
- 6) Name two ways that lumber came and went from Port Moody. Railway, ships
- 7) How do you think early lumber mills effected the environment? Early mills polluted the environment
- 8) Do you think the railway helped or hurt the lumber industry? Why? The railway helped the lumber industry because it needed lumber to build new railroads, it transported lumber to other places and it helped move large trees from the forests to the mills.

- 10) When did the Flavelle Mill close? It hasn't, it's the last mill on Burrard Inlet in operation.
